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## Perry Public Schools partners with LAFCU for student-run branches

LANSING, Mich. — Students in Perry's elementary, middle and high schools will soon be learning the ins and outs of running a credit union and managing their finances.

Through a new partnership, LAFCU and Perry Public Schools are setting up portable branches at each of the district's three school buildings that will be staffed by LAFCU employees, with assistance from Perry students selected through an interview process. Starting Oct. 2, the mini credit unions will be open for two hours on assigned days every other week.

Perry High students who are selected to be assistant tellers will learn valuable interviewing, marketing, bookkeeping, financial and social skills. These volunteer students will receive t-shirts and actually perform supervised transactions.



All students throughout the district – regardless of their age – will learn the importance of savings, goal setting, needs versus wants, and a sense of community.

"Our goal is to have the students learn useful, real-life skills in a positive and safe environment," said Mike Foster, Perry Superintendent. "The more we can teach our kids about saving money, managing that money and even a little bit about running a business, the better prepared they are for the future. It's our job to help them be ready for the real world, and we all know dealing with finances is a big part of that."

Kelli Ellsworth Etchison, LAFCU's Vice President of Community and Business Development, explained that LAFCU will deposit \$5 into each new account that is opened. Parental consent is required for minors. Students will be able to make deposits to, and minimal withdrawals from, their accounts. In addition to savings accounts, LAFCU will also offer youth certificates of deposits.

There is a special program for children up to age 12, added Ellsworth. LAFCU's Planet M is designed to teach them about savings in a fun and rewarding way.

"They'll receive a piggy bank, a passbook to collect stickers for every deposit, and gifts from our treasure chest after collecting 10 stickers," she said. "We truly hope they'll learn valuable life skills through this program. We are excited to be in Perry. The board and staff have been very receptive."

For teens, Ellsworth said LAFCU has a Web site, lafcumyway.com, that offers personal finance tips, fun blogs, quarterly newsletters for both the LAFCU MY WAY and Planet M programs along with other resources.

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Foster pointed out that LAFCU representatives attended the district's open houses at the beginning of the school year and spoke with dozens of families about the new program. Letters were also mailed to every student's home, explaining how LAFCU and the district would be working together. LAFCU will have a booth at Perry's Oct. 10 home football game as another opportunity for the community to become familiar with the organization and how its school branches will work.

LAFCU's partnership with Perry extends to the credit union's exclusive sponsorship of the Greater Lansing Activities Conference, which was announced in April. Perry officials will recognize LAFCU at the district's Oct. 10 football game against Lakewood, another GLAC school. GLAC was formed by Perry, Lakewood, Olivet, Stockbridge, Lansing Christian, Leslie and Maple Valley districts to allow the schools' athletes to play against other schools of similar size, ability and socioeconomic status, and in most cases, closer geographic distance.
